

# ILLEGAL OFFSHORE GAMBLING: A GROWING THREAT



#### FUELLED BY BANNED PRODUCTS, LOOPHOLES AND AGGRESSIVE TACTICS

- Illegal offshore gambling sites offer no consumer protections, no oversight, no guarantee that winnings will be paid out and no avenues for recourse when something goes wrong.
- Illegal platforms out-compete Australian-licensed and regulated operators by paying no tax and don't invest in consumer protection – 48% of players cite better odds and offers as the biggest drivers
- A staggering 50% of offshore players are on BetStop, undermining important consumer protections
- Heavy investment in influencer marketing makes illegal operators look legitimate - nearly 50% of players can't spot them
- A quarter of illegal offshore online gambling spend goes to illegal products like online casino and live in play betting





## AUSTRALIA'S ENFORCEMENT GAPS ARE BEING EXPLOITED

- The ACMA has blocked over a thousand illegal gambling sites, yet operators quickly reappear under new domains
- Without real-time coordination with payment processors or powers to penalise offenders, these criminal enterprises operate unchecked
- Their anonymity, including the use of crypto betting, enables money laundering and match-fixing, threatening the integrity of Australian sport and racing

#### THE SOLUTION: COOPERATION IS KEY

Tackling the illegal offshore market will require collaboration, not only from government and regulators, but also from banks, technology platforms, Australian-licensed and regulated wagering service providers and sporting bodies, to close enforcement gaps and keep Australians betting within the licensed system

#### **KEY RECOMMENDATIONS**

- Sustainable & Competitive Onshore Market
   Ensure taxation, marketing and consumer protection reform minimises harm without driving more betting offshore
- 2. Coordinated Blacklisting & Blocking Framework

Establish a National Illegal Gambling Blacklist Platform to centralise illegal domains, mirror sites and app IDs in one database managed by the ACMA for rapid enforcement

3. Platform Blocking & Content Removal

Empower the eSafety Commissioner to issue binding notices for removal, link deletion, app removal and ISP blocking of illegal gambling content

4. Payments Blocking - Banks & Providers

Require banks and payment providers to block transactions linked to operators listed on the National Illegal Gambling Blacklist Platform

5. Payments Blocking - Crypto

AUSTRAC to issue guidance to crypto exchanges to detect and report gambling-linked wallets

6. Payments Blocking – BetStop Integration
Integrate the National Self-Exclusion Register
with payment monitoring to block transactions

from self-excluded individuals to illegal operators

- Consumer Awareness Certification Scheme Introduce a national certification scheme via industry to help consumers identify licensed operators and promote safe betting
- 8. Consumer Awareness National Campaign Deliver a nationwide campaign alongside the blacklist rollout to educate consumers on checking site legality and safety
- 9. Digital Advertising Verification

Develop a Gambling Advertiser Verification API for search engines, social platforms and digital advertisers to block illegal ads

10. Sports/Racing Content Policing

Ensure official Australian sports and racing data is supplied only to licensed betting operators

11. International Cooperation

Negotiate bilateral enforcement agreements and MOUs with major offshore jurisdictions for mutual crackdowns
